PAYING TRIBUTE TO KEALA O'SULLIVAN 2002 HAWAII SWIMMING HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE

The Swimming Hall of Fame was founded in 2002 by the Hawaii Swimming Legacy Project to memorialize Hawaii's rich heritage of water sports and recognize swimmers, divers, and water polo players who have made important contributions to their sports. Its mission is to promote, preserve, and perpetuate the achievements of Hawaii's swimmers, divers, and water polo athletes. In order to commemorate Hawaii athletes' achievements in water sports, volunteers have gathered, preserved, and disseminated oral histories, photographs, and memorabilia about Hawaii's aquatic sports.

KEALA O'SULLIVAN is one of Hawaii's greatest divers. Keala was one of the inaugural inductees into the Hawaii Swimming Hall of Fame in 2002. She was honored for her outstanding contributions to the sport of diving. Through her diving feats, Keala became the first athlete from Hawaii to rank high in the world of competitive diving.

Her numerous diving achievements include winning the U.S. Junior Amateur Athletics Union (AAU) one-meter board championships when she was fourteen.

One of her greatest accomplishments was winning a bronze medal at the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City in the three-meter board diving event. She also won a National AAU one-meter springboard championship title.

The Senate of the State of Hawaii pays tribute to KEALA O'SULLIVAN for her 2002 induction to the Hawaii Swimming Hall of Fame, recognizes her many achievements and contributions to the sport of swimming, and extends its warmest aloha and best wishes for continued success in all future endeavors.
