The Swimming Hall of Fame was founded in 2002 by the Hawaii Swimming Legacy Project to memorialize Hawaii's rich heritage of water sports and recognize swimmers, divers, and water polo players who have made important contributions to their sports. Its mission is to promote, preserve, and perpetuate the achievements of Hawaii's swimmers, divers, and water polo athletes. In order to commemorate Hawaii athletes' achievements in water sports, volunteers have gathered, preserved, and disseminated oral histories, photographs, and memorabilia about Hawaii's aquatic sports.

LEIGH JOSEPHSON is one of Hawaii's greatest contributors to the sport of water polo. Leigh was one of the inaugural inductees into the Hawaii Swimming Hall of Fame in 2002. He was honored for his outstanding contributions to the sport of water polo.

Leigh revolutionized the sport of water polo in Hawaii during his tenure as a coach at Iolani Schools from 1962 to 1973. As a coach, he produced many All Americans in swimming and water polo.
